Those feelings were deepened a while back when we were driving our trusty '55 Clipper on the Gulf Freeway on our way to the LSP meeting.

We were meeting at Pappas BBQ and then travelling the short distance to the 1940 Houston Municipal Airport Museum. About two miles from the restaurant exit, a lane on our side of the freeway was closed due to construction.

We were bumper to bumper for more than a mile just creeping along. You guessed it, the Clipper overheated and died and would not start again. Workers blocked one lane and we blocked another making a bad situation even worse! We were rescued pretty quickly by Chris in his Bronco with a tow strap. The car did restart after he got us to safety and we made the lunch just as the others were about to leave for the airport. We had to skip the museum because we had a memorial to go to and we got there in the Packard and all was well. But that stall on the freeway really was a nightmare come true!

All of the above weighed heavily on me as I planned a route to Salado. I decided to go through Alvin, get on State Hwy 6 and before we got to Sugarland switch over to University Blvd. University Blvd. runs parallel to 6, has very few lights and moves quickly to the Southwest Frwy. We would take 59 (SW Frwy) to the Grand Parkway and ultimately to 290 as we had done many times before.

About a mile from 59, we suddenly came to a stop as all but one lane on University Blvd. was blocked and the traffic was literally creeping. After about 15 minutes and no more than 60 feet, our '54 began to overheat like the '55 had on the Gulf Freeway! As we crept forward and the needle got closer and closer to the "H" mark, a driveway to the Texas Instruments Co. appeared and I dashed in. I turned the engine off and raised the hood. It was a pretty windy day and after about 20 minutes the temp gauge regained its composure. I discovered there was another drive in that parking lot that was considerably further down University Blvd. We took that exit and got back on University much closer to 59. Once we got on 59, we proceeded without incident to the Grand Parkway and then on to 290. We have taken the 290 route dozens of times since we first attended the Salado meet in 1977. It was a great drive until we got to the other side of Giddings where we were brought to a halt by a really long train! We waited and waited and the car began to overheat again. Just in time the train passed! In all the years we have taken that route, we had never

encountered a train before! The rest of the trip was uneventful.

Sunday morning early, we started the trip back to Houston. We decided to stay on 290 and since it was Sunday morning, we would use the freeway system to get back to League City. Remember when I said we had never seen a train in Giddings before? Just as I said it would be funny if we got stopped again the crossing arms came down! This train was even longer than the first. The car began to overheat but thankfully the train passed, and we got back to highway speeds and the car cooled off. The trip the rest of the way was fine, even though we traveled Beltway 8 and the dreaded Gulf Freeway.

Not sure how we are going next year but it will be a different route for sure!

Our '54 Cavalier never left us on the road but there is a transmission leak and we did have to change a fuel filter.

Our son Chris is a manager at Mac Haik Ford in Pasadena. He called his buddy at Mac Haik Ford in Georgetown and they graciously let us drive over, use one of their lifts, and fill the transmission with seal leak and trans fluid. Unlike newer cars, you cannot access the dip stick under the hood, but you have to get it on a lift and add the fluid below. We had no more mechanical issues or leaks

Despite the traffic issues, the cold wet weather, and the transmission leak, we had a wonderful time. Forty cars were supposed to be there, but we had the prettiest 18 wet Packards anyone had ever seen! Many came even if they left the Packard at home. We really enjoyed seeing our friends from the other 3 regions. Many of them we only get to see in Salado. I look forward to Salado every year and I think our family has only missed 3 out of the 46 meets. I start looking forward to the next meet as soon as we pull out of the hotel parking lot! Rain or shine we have a good time so join us next April!

By the way, our route did get us a second award! The Long-Distance Award

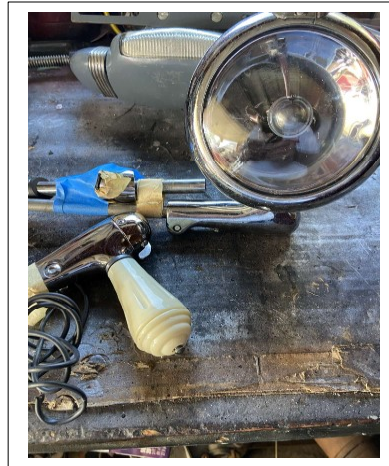

The 47th Texas Packard Meet will be held in Salado on *April 9th through the 12th, 2026*.

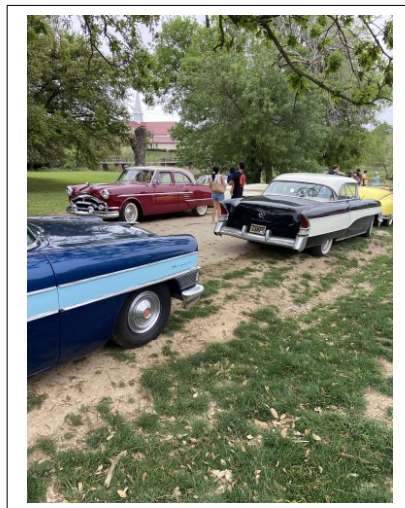

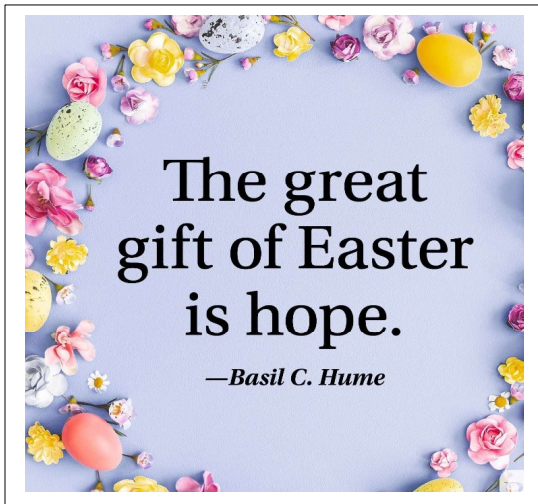
